Dear Friends at TaB

If the average cost of a funeral, including the limos, is around £4,500 then the funeral industry in the UK has made somewhere in the region of £571 million pounds from Covid related deaths this last year. Companies such as Amazon, Deliveroo, UberEats & other such delivery companies are also making their mark on a changing world.

Churches are having to adapt to changing behaviours too. Some churches are still not open for worship, some churches have focussed their activities with online worship and Zoom. Others have gradually moved to outside worship now the weather is improving again. At Christmas last year we attended a "drive in' Christmas service...."Hoot if you love Jesus"!

If you are fortunate to have a garden and have managed to get out into it this Spring, you will know the amount of work involved in weeding and pruning. We spent a couple of hours brutally cutting back an overgrown bush in our front garden, as many of the branches looked dead and were strangling the growth of others. A few years back we had a cherry tree that looked as though it was having second thoughts and we cut it back so severely that we thought that was the end. This year it has produced so many blossom petals that it is a glorious sight. Our garden is aglow with spring blossoms from our apple and cherry trees.

In the period of Lent we are asked to effectively cut back on our excesses and focus on what is real in our lives. We are asked to think what is important and what can be let go: to prune things that do not give glory to God. Let them go. The remaining parts of our lives are then given the space to grow and develop and we too can rejoice in our resurrection. Post Covid-19 we are heading toward, what many are calling, the "New Normal".

John 14:1 says ""Let not your hearts be troubled. Believe in God; believe also in me"

In the lockdown period we have experienced, the one message I have taken is that family and friends are vital to our survival as a community. We have found that speaking to family and friends has a become more of a regular occurrence than before. It was so easy to get caught up and strangled by the activities of ones' life at the expense of nurturing and growing good relationships.

## LECTIONARY REFLECTION

### Reflection on Psalm 23 & John 10:11-18 The Good Shepherd

In today's Gospel Jesus says twice "I am the good shepherd" He knows the sheep and the sheep know him. "The good shepherd lays down his life for his sheep." Christ demonstrated His love for us by dying for us while we were still sinners.

The shepherd will lead, guide protect and preserve the unity of the flock. and that is what Jesus does for us.

The reality is that at times in our lives we do feel and behave like lost sheep, wandering aimlessly, feeling vulnerable and uncertain, even afraid during this lifting of lockdown. After months of seeing limited numbers of people out on the streets, to see so many people at once can be overwhelming. To know that our Lord will be there to restore our soul and bring to us the comfort and peace that we need in those times, and provide for our every need is a blessing indeed. It reinforces the intimacy of the relationship we have with God through His Son and the love that He freely pours upon us day after day.

The psalmist in Psalm 23 attests to the goodness of the shepherd.

"The Lord is my shepherd; I have everything I need. He lets me rest in fields of green grass and leads me to quiet pools of fresh water. He gives me new strength. He guides me in the right paths, as he has promised. Even if I go through the deepest darkness, I will not be afraid, Lord, for you are with me. Your shepherd's rod and staff protect me. You prepare a banquet for me, where all my enemies can see me; you welcome me as an honoured guest and fill my cup to the brim. I know that your goodness and love will be with me all my life; and your house will be my home as long as I live". (Psalm 23 GNB)

When we cry out - he comes to us, when we look for him - he is there to assist us, and when we are in danger, he rescues us, but the most marvellous thing of all is this: when we stray from him, he seeks us out and bring us back to the safety and the comfort of his fold.

Jesus teaches us to follow his example and emulate his characteristics of care for all

John also illustrates that the role of the true shepherd is not only to be inward looking and care for the flock already in his care but to be outward looking and bring in sheep that are not part of the flock.

There are many obstacles and dangers in our lives, and many things that challenge us and we can be overwhelmed by them, thinking of the people of St Vincent whose lives have been thrown into turmoil by the eruption of La Soufriere and the increased death from Corona Virus in India. As we move away from lockdown into our new normal, let's remember to be kind to one other, for not everyone is ready to embrace the outside world just yet.

As we reflect let us pause for a moment and sense the presence of the good shepherd with us. Jesus who lead, guide, protect and nurture us. Love us so much that he died for us.Do you know the voice of the good shepherd; are you part of his flock?

When we know the voice of Jesus and can say with conviction that the Lord is my shepherd then we know we lack nothing. Praise God.
