Dear Friends at TaB

It was a real joy to share in worship with you last Sunday. Of course, we weren't able to socialise very much, but I came away with the certainty that as a Church you were in good heart and looking forward to being able to worship more fully over the coming months.

These past months have been exceedingly difficult for us all, but we thank God that our prayers have been answered and vaccines have been developed to provide a real opportunity for us to overcome this pandemic. Our thoughts and prayers are very much centred upon India. As we see the suffering and heartache in that huge nation it re-emphasises that we are one race, one people, all children of God. We must continue to urge our leaders to share more fully with those parts of the world that do not have access to the medical care and vaccines that we have here in Britain.

This past year has also helped us come to a deeper understanding of our inter-connectedness as churches in the New River circuit. The weekly online worship each Sunday has been really appreciated by hundreds of people across the circuit and around the world, as have the daily prayers and Thought for the Day videos. We have met as the circuit for an Advent course and more recently a Lenten Sunday evening series which has helped those who have joined on zoom to get to know others from the different churches. It is our prayer that this newfound sense of circuit will continue in the years ahead. This is the vision that was shared recently at our Circuit Meeting in a paper "One church, one circuit" _that you will hopefully discuss at TAB looking at how we can pool our resources and work more easily as one unit across our nine church sites. I do wonder what the future will be like in a year's time. Will all our members and friends have returned to worship with us, or will we find some prefer now to stay at home and worship online? Some people may have found other churches in which to worship or have really struggled with faith and the virus and no longer believe. We will need to work together to encourage 'our people' to not only return but to do so with a new commitment to serve God. These past thirteen months have provided us with so many new opportunities and we must grasp them. This is why we are running the Sunday evening course "Everyone an Evangelist" so as to equip us....and it is not too late to join, please talk to the Rev Sam.

As we enter this new month of May it is full of opportunities to celebrate, especially the gift of the Holy Spirit. Pentecost Sunday is the 23rd May, the birthday of the Church. In the evening, our own Rev Matt will be sharing in the London District Testimony Service (on zoom) where he and others will share their faith story before their ordination the following month. Then the next day, the 24th May, is Wesley's Day when it is an opportunity to remind ourselves why we are Methodists and to listen again to the way God can use us in the years ahead.

So let us rejoice that God has watched over us, held us and kept us for this moment when together, in the power of the Spirit, we can share the love and grace of Jesus Christ with one another and all those we encounter day by day.

LECTIONARY REFLECTION

Acts 8 26-40, Psalm 22, 25-32 , 1 John 4, 7-21, John 15 1-8

have been converted. Some of them history records. God knoweth them all.

Writing the lectionary notes is a joy and a privilege. It has taken me on a journey of exploration through the bible that has led to some very interesting discoveries. Today, using the modern research tool of the internet, I stumbled across John Wesley's notes. I was surprised to find these freely available online, not just in a dusty book in a university library or for sale in a specialist book shop. What a great resource our founder has left us! And I was even more surprised to read how relevant John Wesley's words are to our current situation.

TaB has embarked on a journey, of preparing each of us, working together and as individuals, to become evangelists, to spread the Good News of God's love revealed through Christ. Let me quote just some of the comments on today's familiar story of evangelism: Phillip and the Ethiopian, Acts ch 8, v 26-40.

Note 28. Sitting in his chariot, he read the Prophet Isaiah - God meeteth those that remember him in his ways. It is good to read, hear, seek information even in a journey. Why should we not redeem all our time?

Note 30. And Philip running to him, said, Understandest thou what thou readest? - He did not begin about the weather, news, or the like. In speaking for God, we may frequently come to the point at once, without circumlocution. Note 32. The portion of Scripture - By reading that very chapter, the fifty-third of Isaiah, many Jews, yea, and atheists,

Note 33.b. And who shall declare, or count his generation - That is, who can number his seed, (Isaiah 53, 10) which he hath purchased by laying down his life? (Suzy: Who can number His followers, brought into a relationship with God through Christ).

Note 36. And as they went on the way they came to a certain water - Thus, even the circumstances of the journey were under the direction of God. The kingdom of God suits itself to external circumstances, without any violence, as air yields to all bodies, and yet pervades all.

The story continues with Philip baptising the Ethiopian. No need for a 6-week study course or a traditional ceremony in front of specially invited guests. Just the recognition of God sending Christ and a belief in His saving grace, reinforced by a physical demonstration of being washed clean, ready to start a new life.

I am particularly struck by the idea that we should use our time on journeys to read, hear and seek information. On our long drive to Cornwall this weekend, I will definitely do that! But more importantly, perhaps we should all note what is said about coming to the point. There are times to be alongside someone, to quietly, gradually, build a relationship before speaking about our faith but there may be times to cut through the small talk and challenge. Let us pray for the insight and judgement to know which is the best approach in our situations.

The three other bible passages chosen for today link to the story from Acts: Psalm 22, 25-32 "future generations will be told about the Lord, and proclaim his deliverance to a people yet unborn, saying that he has done it"

John's first letter, Chapter 4, 7-21 "We have seen and do testify that the Father has sent his Son as the Saviour of the world..." God abides in those who do confess that Jesus is the Son of God and they abide in Him.

And these words of Jesus from John's Gospel Chapter 15, 1-8: "Just as the branch cannot bear fruit by itself unless it abides in the vine, neither can you unless you abide in me. I am the vine, you are the branches. Those who abide in me and I in them bear much fruit, because apart from me you can do nothing."

So, in recognition that we can do nothing unless we abide in Christ, let us give thanks for His loving strength and pray for His guidance, that we, like Philip, may bring others to a relationship with God.
